REAP THE REWARDS OF GARDENING WITH YOUR CHILD

Spring is here and so is the opportunity to begin gardening with your family! Find a location where children can sow and reap the rewards of planting. Even if a small plot cannot be found, a container garden makes a fine alternative. A garden need not be extensive or have dozens of plants. A barrel, a window box, or gallon jugs cut in half will do nicely.

Gardening allows children to plan and work together to create something that they believe is important, and it offers opportunity to introduce reading, writing, math, and science. Even young children can do "research" to find out what kinds of plants might grow best in their yards or containers. A trip to the library or local greenhouse can help children increase their knowledge about how to take care of plants.

Math skills are developed during the gardening process. Children can count seeds as they plant, measure the distance between plants, mark the calendar for the anticipated date of seedling appearance, and chart and measure the height of the plants as they grow. Science lessons emerge as the plants grow and as beneficial and harmful insects make their appearances.

Reading and writing skills are enhanced when books about gardening are read to children and when children draw pictures or write stories about their own plants. Books such as <u>The Little Red Hen</u> by P. Galdone, <u>The Carrot Seed</u> by Ruth Krauss, <u>Planting a Rainbow</u> by Lois Ehlert, <u>Growing Vegetable Soup</u> by Lois Ehlert, and <u>From Seed to Plant</u> by Gail Gibbons are some of the many books that can help stimulate children's interest in planting.

Another benefit to gardening is that children develop a sense of responsibility caring for their gardens. They feel a true sense of pride and accomplishment as their plants grow bigger and bigger and as they share their harvest. And of course, they can then take an active role in helping to prepare their vegetables for a simple nutritious snack or prepare them as part of a full meal. It's a wonderful opportunity to spend quality time with your child while you both learn and have fun in the process!

Book Corner



Check out your local library for "To Market to Market" by Anne Miranda. It is a great book for all ages, especially toddlers and preschoolers. Children will not get tired of hearing this fun story and parents will not get tired of reading the same story over many times which children, as adults know...love to do!

The bright pictures of animals and the colorfully dressed lady shopping for her lunch makes the book interesting for young children. The story puts a new spin on the old rhyme To Market, to Market to Buy a Fat Pig. Parents can even make up their own story from the colorful pictures without reading a word of the story. Each time the story is read, parents can focus on a different learning concept like numbers, colors, animals, favorite foods or concepts of under and over.

Parents can create activities for children to do after reading the story. Ask children to think of what words rhyme with "goat". Ask the young listeners to point to all the red things in the story. Ask the child to be a spy and find all the animals that are hiding. Help a toddler to make the sounds the animals make or even name different animals or objects in the pictures. This activity helps build vocabulary and increase literacy skills. Parents can even keep their preschooler busy while grocery shopping by writing a list of foods from the story on a small pad. Draw some pictures next to the words that help a child recognize or know the word – you don't have to be an artist, the children can help! When you get to the store, put the child in the grocery cart – keep them safe – and ask them to find all of the items on their shopping list. They can check the items off on the list with a crayon. This activity keeps them busy while parents find the bargains.



21st Century Exploring Parenting Class

This parenting class especially tailored for parents of children ages birth to five is offered to Head Start parents at least twice every year. If you are interested, please speak with your Family Advocate or Home Visitor.

Parents from the first Exploring Parenting group were asked how the class has helped them. It could be what they have gained from attending, participation in the class or a way their family has been influenced. Here are some statements that were shared.

- \Rightarrow I'm getting my kids to put their feelings into words instead of hitting and biting each other.
- \Rightarrow I learned why making time for my family is important.
- \Rightarrow I learned the difference between punishment and discipline.
- ⇒ I learned in Exploring Parenting that I really have to stop and listen to what my children are saying to me. I want my boys to know that they can always come to me with anything and that I will always love them no matter what they are going through.
